MODULE 2: PREPARING FOR A COMPELLING SERMON

MODULE INTRODUCTION

Why do we preach? The purpose of these modules is not to just give you information about how to write and deliver sermons. We want to inspire you to preach compelling sermons! That doesn't happen by accident, though. It takes lots of preparation and practice. And it all begins by deciding on the right "shape" of your sermon, the one that will set you up for success and ready your audience to respond. In this module, you will learn the importance of four particular sermon shapes, why they are so effective, and how to use them to your advantage.

DECIDING ON YOUR SERMON'S SHAPE

Before you put pen to paper for your sermon, it will be helpful to choose the most effective structure. Just like picking out a blueprint for your future house! You'll be more focused in your sermon prep and more effective in your sermon delivery. Knowing the ins and outs of each of these four sermon shapes will give you a handle on each sermon blueprint.

A SERMON THAT CONVEYS A TRUTH

Truth is at the heart of preaching. When we read the Word of God, we are encountering truth. As a preacher, it is your task to present that truth to your audience in a way they can understand and apply. That's why this may be the most important of the four sermon shapes!
